Green Day Celebration: Dominicans' Renewal of their Commitment to Protect Mother Earth

The entire DIS learning community has shown solidarity with the rest of the world in celebrating Earth Day 2024 on 22nd April during the Monday Morning Assembly.

Dubbed "DIS Green Day", Dominicans demonstrated their collective effort to promote awareness and strengthen commitment to caring for our common home—Earth—by wearing green on that particular day.

The Religious Studies Department collaborated with Earthday.Org, Washington DC, USA; the STEM Department; Global Issues; Community Service Programme; and the TEDEd Club to actualise this year's Earth Day theme, "Planet Vs. Plastics." All Religious Studies classes from K1 to 12 successfully completed different meaningful eco-activities to raise awareness and strengthen their commitments to be good stewards of God's creation.

Junior Lower School students made improvised bird feeders out of recyclables under the supervision of Ms Annie Lin. Ms Jessy Cardenas engaged her Religious Studies I and 2 students in arts. The Upper Lower School students prepared their own fairy gardens and decorated their plants with recyclable materials under the supervision of Mr John Erick Moje. Middle School Science classes, under the supervision of Ms Bing Racadio, made shampoo out of natural ingredients. Mr Jayno Jabonillo inspired his class to prepare educational posters and creative photos for the same cause. Selected STEM classes under the supervision of Dr Ram Gopal made an educational video clip, fostering great awareness about Earth Day and suggesting practical ways to take care of our environment at home and at school.

This meaningful activity reminded everyone of our collective responsibility to protect Earth's natural resources for future generations. Tracing the history, the first Earth Day was held on 22 April 1970. That was 53 years ago and yet until now, clean water sanitation and climate action remain a concern as stated in the 17 Sustainable Development Goals or Global Goals according to the United Nations.

Pope Francis issued a significant document called "Laudato Si" or "Care for Our Common Home" in May 2015. It focuses on care for the natural environment and all people of goodwill, as well as broader questions of the relationship between God, humans, and the Earth. The same advocacy is enshrined in our D'TORCH values. We can express our helpfulness by being respectful and caring towards our environment.

The DIS Model United Nations Club traveled to The Netherlands in January to attend the THIMUN The Hague conference at World Forum The Hague.

The team, consisting of four dedicated students, represented the delegation of the League of Arab States, engaging in diplomatic simulations, debates, and negotiations on a wide range of global issues.

The conference lasted for a total of 4 days, with over 3,200 participants from approximately 200 schools across different countries. Throughout the conference, the students actively engaged in networking and socializing, forging meaningful connections beyond the formal debate sessions. Whether it was during lobbying, breaks, or even bus rides and tours, members of the DISMUN club, especially Leo Yeh, the Assistant Head Delegate, embraced the chance to interact with peers from diverse backgrounds.

Aside from attending the conference, the DISMUN team also visited numerous places in The Netherlands. On the first few days of the trip, they visited downtown The Hague. Under the responsible leadership of Amy Lin, the members of the delegation explored iconic landmarks and immersed themselves in Dutch culture.

The tour began with a visit to the Mauritshuis, the art museum containing Vermeer's "Girl with a Pearl Earring" and other masterpieces from the Golden Age of Dutch painting.

One of the highlights of their trip was a stop at a traditional Dutch cheese shop. The delegation had the opportunity to sample and learn about various types of Dutch cheeses, renowned for their rich flavors and craftsmanship.

for a guided tour. Led by knowledgeable university staff and students, they explored the historic campus and admired the architectural beauty of its campus buildings.

World Scholar's Cup Regional Round, 2024

World Scholar's Cup is a world-wide competition that gives students the opportunity to explore and learn about various topics that they would not otherwise touch upon in their academic careers, from 6 different subject areas under an overall theme that changes every year.

Students, in teams of 3, must use this acquired knowledge in 4 major events: collaborative essay writing, team debate, scholar's bowl, and scholar's challenge.

This year the annual World Scholar's Cup Regional Round was held in Hsinchu on March 10th and 11th, bringing together approximately 400 students from schools all over Taiwan. 36 Middle and 3 high school students from DIS attended this fun, exciting but challenging competition.

During the Collaborative Writing event, each team member had to choose I of the 6 given prompts to write about. Initially, the team members collaborated, giving ideas and suggestions to help each other.

The prompt had to be answered in a creative way to catch the judge's attention, and stand out from others'

writing. Then, we had 40 minutes to write. After which, there was another 15 minutes of collaboration to review each oth-

er's work and give feedback. Great writers from our school Sophie Luna, Jamie Cheng, and Camille Ganhao were awarded 3rd place for Collaborative Writing in the Junior Division. Then there was the Scholar's Challenge, featuring 120 questions about Social Studies, Science,

Literature & Definition of the Music & Definition of the name!) Media, History, Music & Definition of the name!) multiple choice quiz that tested scholars' knowledge on areas related to the year's theme,

Reimagining the Present. Some of the DIS students did really well in the Challenge. Brandon Yu, Prithika Chatterjee, and Ruthvij Potharaju came 2 nd in the Junior Division of the Team Challenge!

After the Challenge it was time for the Team Debate. Each team debated against 3 opposing teams, depending on their debate tree, and whether they had won or lost the debate. Debate topics included "Should we change country flags once per generation?" and "Should planes fly half the speed they fly at now?" Sophie Luna who was ranked the 2nd best debater in the Junior Division, was chosen to debate in the Debate Showcase, where the best debaters get to show their skills. Brandon Yu who ranked 3 rd, and

his teammates, Prithika Chatterjee and Ruthvij Potharaju were awarded I st place for Team Debate in the Iunior Division.

Day 2 started off with the exciting Scholar's Day 2 started off with the exciting Scholar's Bowl, an event similar to the Scholar's Challenge, but

during this challenge, the questions were displayed on a large screen, and team members were allowed to

work together. It was like a game show where teams tried to earn as many points as possible. Each

question was worth a certain number of points, and the points increased as the competition progressed.

The final question was worth a whopping 1000 points: you should have seen the way the scholars went wild

when the answer was revealed! Brandon Yu, Prithika Chatterjee, and Ruthvij Potharaju came 2 nd in the

Junior Division of the Scholar's Bowl!

That wasn't the end of the World Scholar's Cup, though. After the Scholar's Bowl, it was time for the

famed Debate Showcase. The top eight debaters, of which Sophie Luna was one, were divided into 2

teams, and given a challenging topic to debate. We watched in awe as the eight debaters presented their
