

GRADE LEVEL: AP Chinese SY: 2023 - 2024

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COURSE DESCRIPTION

AP Chinese Language and Culture is for qualified students who are interested in completing studies Chinese comparable at the college level.

The goal of AP Chinese is to enable students to master conventions of Communication with Chinese society and culture, the use in different linguistic registers, advanced-level Chinese language structures.

Students in the course have the following the Standards for Chinese Language Learning to promote Chinese language, including listening, Speaking, Reading, and Writing.

Students should be able to understand the textbook and given materials both in Speaking and in reading and be able to discuss the cultural aspects of the readings in Chinese.

To be able to use the knowledge gained through course materials to develop critical thinking skills, to communicate more effectively both in the school setting and in real-life situations.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- At the end of this course students should be able to speak, to read, to write with basic Chinese.
- Students should be able to recognize and use basic Chinese correctly in their written and spoken work.
- Students should be able to apply the various grammar rules taught correctly, and recognize and correct mistakes found in their work.
- Students should be able to apply all they have learned in the written work they have to complete.
- Students should be able to speak Chinese confidently, using the knowledge they have acquired, and showing this in the oral presentations they have to give.

TEACHING STRATEGIES

A variety of different teaching strategies will be used to impart knowledge to the students. The lessons should be student centered – meaning that students should be doing a lot of talking, with the teacher guiding and explaining where necessary. In this way, students will become more confident Chinese speakers. Students will get to work alone, as well as in groups of various sizes, and will do written as well as oral presentations to show what they have learned.

The primary textbook is *CHINESE CUSTOMS AND TRADITIONS VOL.2* by Xiou-Yu Chang, Fu-yi Chang, and Sue-zhen Ho, its accompanying supplementary workbook by Zheng-Zhong. This textbook contains 20 lessons; each topic focuses on the rapidly changing attitudes and values of Chinese culture. Other resources such as short literary pieces, newspaper articles, and films are also used to encourage students to understand and interpret different forms of spoken and written language on a variety of topics in Chinese.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

Students will do a variety of different activities to practice what they have learned, and to make sure that they understand the material that has been taught to them.

Activities include:

1. Reading:

Students prepare, explain words, and using sample sentences in class.

I also give students some general comprehension questions to answer while in Chinese class. These are usually general background questions related to the topic or general comprehension questions on the introduction piece of the unit. I use these questions to start a class discussion, which can take place in small groups first and then as a whole class. Students also need to finish and accomplish reading four famous Chinese classic books, like DREAM OF THE RED CHAMBER (紅樓 夢), JOURNEY TO THE (西 遊 記), RECORD OF THE THREE KINGDOMS (三 國 誌), OUTLAWS OF THE MARSH (水 滸 傳) etc. Through reading practice, most students feel comfortable speaking on the topic in class if they have seriously followed up with all the preparation exercises.

- Be able to recognize the 2000~2500 commonly used Chinese characters
- Know Chinese characters, the change of pronunciation and definition of a word as well as to use electric dictionary. Have the ability to enjoy Chinese characters
- Be able to read the data of Chinese newspapers and books or checking dictionaries
- Appreciate Chinese literature works as poems of new and old styles, couplets etc. as well as presentation simple opinions.
- Can inspire and improve writing ability
- Catch important information easily and increase reading speed

2. Grammar:

- students will review/learn different parts of speech and other grammar rules
- students 'll learn how to find, correct grammar errors in written & spoken work
- students will get to know how to use grammar correctly in sentence making

3 Listening

Supplementary materials such as Textbooks, Holidays, short readings, Newspaper articles, films, and short TV plays etc. Each lesson in the textbook contains a list of vocabulary words. Students are required to study the list before. Students will learn the background of each Chinese holidays year round, including cultures, and stories.

- Develop listening skills and able to communicate well with people.
- After listening from each holiday, students need to have the ability to retell and write down the information with critical thinking.

4. Writing:

The textbook has a grammar explanation section with excellent sample sentences that illustrate the structure. Students can study independently and bring questions to class as we start our discussion of the reading. Students keep a journal; they write on a subject they choose or on assigned topics, depending on the theme of the week. All these exercises will help students prepare for the AP Exam.

- Use calligraphy and its tools to reach beautiful standard for appropriate level
- Collect information and write essays easily.
- Able to write sentences and patterns correctly
- Able to edit and correct others mistakes.

5. **Oral**:

Students do many different types of exercises to improve all four language skills. There are cloze exercises in the textbook and workbook for filling in blanks, multiple-choice questions, and sentence-making exercises for vocabulary practice and reinforcement.

Students are required to use the language lab for listening and speaking practice on the texts and related news reports for each class.

All students are expected to participate actively in class discussion because this is the best way to improve their oral expression and overall communicative competence.

- Have the ability to explain personal opinion
- Can performance properly
- Able to speak the point and have good communication

*Students need to complete the assignments from AP class, including visit National Palace Museum, Watch Confucius Ceremony in Teacher's Day, fly a kite, preparing 8 famous Chinese dishes, watch Chinese movies have debate after and give long essay with critical thinking...etc.

ASSESSMENT

The quarterly grade will be awarded for all student work based on school policy of

- √ 30% Homework, Seatwork and Projects
- √ 30% Tests and Quizzes
- √ 30% Quarter Exam
- √ 10% Deportment

There will be opportunities for students to show their learning through individual and group writing and other activities. All work done by the students will be graded and used for assessment. The following assessment tools will be used to evaluate performance:

- Peer coaching and Peer evaluation
- Portfolio

HOMEWORK RULES

- All assignments must be turned in on the due date.
- If work is a day late, 10% is deducted; if more than a day late, students have to complete the assignment after school in Chinese classroom, and only receive a maximum of 60%.
- If a student has been absent, he/she needs to give homework next day.
- If a student is absent for a test, they will receive a **0** score, unless they have a **very good** reason for being absent and retest again.

CLASSROOM RULES

- Be on time and neatly dressed, in full school uniform.
- Speak in CHINESE ONLY during Chinese class.
- Respect your teachers, fellow students and their property.
- Keep your seating space and classroom clean and neat.
- Only a water bottle is allowed during class; no eating or drinking of other liquids.
- Ask permission to leave the class.

 Neither cheating nor plagiarism in ANY form will be accepted. Anyone caught doing either during an assessment will be given a 0, and will NOT be given another chance.
