COURSE DESCRIPTION

This AP US History course is designed to ensure the students understand the breadth and depth of US history. After taking this course, students will be able to read, understand, and identify through primary and secondary sources important phases in US history, as well as name the characters, places, and events that helped expand the United States of America into the global power it is today. Over the course of the course, we will be synthesizing this knowledge to ensure that the information is contextualized as the growth of the country we know today. The information in this course will be pertinent to the relevant AP test, and students will be expected to study and perform readings to prepare themselves.

To accomplish this, students will run through a standardized weekly routine. Some of these days will be double periods. This routine may change if students have holidays or a partial school week, but it will be followed for all standard 5-day school weeks. All these assignments will be posted to Google Classroom a week in advance.

- 1. Round Table Discussion: Students will arrive in class having read the material assigned for the week. They will discuss what they read, what they think is important, and how the US has changed over time during this period. Note that discussing why they think the material is key; minimal points will be given for simply regurgitating what the textbook says. The teacher will listen and grade based on the quality of the contribution. (Daily Work: 10 pts)
- 2. Debate (2 class periods): At the beginning of class, students will be divided into two groups and given a topic. The first period will be spent researching and preparing. The second period will be the debate. Each student is expected to speak for 2-3 minutes for or against the topic. Students will be graded based on Strategy (is this an effective thesis to prove their point), Content (is the thesis supported by specific examples), and Presentation (is the student speaking clearly and succinctly). (Daily Work: 20 pts)
- 3. In Class Lecture: The instructor will provide Google Slides and do a lecture on the material students have been going over. Doing this later in the process should help make the material more memorable and ensure students read the book rather than wait for the teacher to explain the material to them.
- 4. Assessment: See below

At the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Read and comprehend history/social studies texts independently and proficiently.
- Evaluate various explanations for actions or events and determine which explanation best accords with textual evidence, acknowledging where the text leaves matters uncertain.
- Evaluate an author's premises, claims, and evidence by corroborating or challenging them with other information.
- Determine the central ideas or information of a primary or secondary source; provide an accurate summary that clarifies the relationships among the key details and ideas.
- Cite specific textual evidence to support analysis of primary and secondary sources, connecting insights gained from specific details to an understanding of the text as a whole.

Understand and elucidate information regarding US history for the purposes of excelling at the Advanced Placement exam.

ASSESSMENT

Students will use the College Board website to practice writing AP-style exams. These can be multiple-choice, essay, or document-based questions. Laptops will be required to access the College Board website and take the tests. In the event of covid-19 forcing the class to go online, these quizzes will be done at home during a 90-minute window. The time will be announced on Google Classroom a week in advance.

Some weeks the students will review essays already completed. During these classes, answers or sample essays will be presented and reviewed one-by-one to indicate why some answers were correct and why some essays got points, and some didn't. This material will give students a better understanding of how the College Board grades their essays and how they write multiple-choice exams.

There are four Quarterly Exams for this subject. These will be College Board questions printed out and written with a pencil and eraser. The Quarter 4 exam will be a full AP Mock Exam and resemble the AP exam. These exams should be given in early May but are subject to change based on College Board.
