COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Welcome to the World Religion course!

Understanding the basics of *World Religions* in a multicultural and global world is a must. The students will learn how to respect different religions' set of beliefs and to properly understand the worldviews they shape without prejudice and bias. This will help them to recognize the diversity of the human world and culture as a positive yet challenging characteristic. Interviewing people of different religions and connecting religion with other subjects will help the students to build a positive relationship toward people and the various academic and social fields.
