COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The *Philosophy of the Human Person* course for grade 9 students is anchored on the three Pillars of the Campus Ministry Department namely: the "Word" for Doctrine, the "Witness" for the valuing and application of the concept learned, and the "Worship" for the celebration of faith. The harmony of these three pillars will help ensure holistic formation of the students.

This course will commence with the basic understanding of Philosophy exploring the richness of its origin and its significant impact to our civilization. This Philosophical background will lead the students to understand the concept of God. Further, students are expected to learn the wisdom and thoughts of the renowned philosophers from the ancient world down to contemporary thought. The students then will relate their valued learnings from these thoughts and relate them to their respective lives.
