#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

In the Grade 6 geography course, students will begin by learning about the foundations of geography. Students will learn about the Five Themes of Geography, geographers' tools, climate zones, ecosystems, and time zones. Once this foundation is established, the course will traverse into the areas of history, governments, economic systems, culture, cultural diffusion, and developed nations versus under-developed nations. This knowledge will be amalgamated to answer geography's essential question: What is and why is it there?

The course will then delve into Europe, Northern Eurasia, and Africa. The foundations will be implemented to provide a cogent understanding of these regions.

#### **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

- a.) Students will identify the main point of the text and explain the supporting details used to supplement the main point.
- b.) Expect secondary texts from credible and valid sources such as BBC, PBS, National Geographic, etc. The textbook only serves to provide a basic understanding. Supplementation is essential.

- a.) In this course, writing responses will be the bulk of the assessments.
- b.) You will be required to create structured responses which include information from secondary sources. Working on properly citing your work will be required.
