DISTINCTION AWARDS

To qualify for this award, candidates should have been students at DIS for the last two years. They should have completed the entire course in no more than the number of prescribed curriculum years, and should never have failed a subject in any quarter. To graduate "with distinction," a student must have qualified for Academic Honors in at least one quarter during grade 11 or grade 12 and must obtain a general average of at least B+(87%) or higher, including Department, in grade 11 and grade 12 respectively. Sr. Socorro, O.P. shared that the prayerful nature of Sr. Margarita was shown in her great love for the liturgy. Sr. Flor, O.P. recalled how Sr. Margarita’s vow of obedience had become a constant guiding principle in her community life. She always arrived ahead of time before a celebration of the Holy Mass and always shared a smile or laughter at different celebrations. Sr. Zenaida, O.P. affectionately recounted the days that she would see Sr. Margarita gazing at the students playing on the field or at the teachers and staff getting ready for work and silently offer her warm prayers. She was as loving as she was lovable. Indeed, for most of her life, she was a blessing to people around her, and now she is an eternal blessing to us,

for she has joined her Creator and Savior, our Lord Jesus Christ. In the last moments of his life, Dominic, consoling the brethren, said, “My little children, do not weep. I will be more helpful in heaven than on earth.”



Conference Presentation

On December 17, 2021, at the International Annual Conference of Teaching Chinese as a Second Language, organized by the Association of Teaching Chinese as a Second Language (ATCSL), Taiwan, Ms. Carolyn Hsu presented “A Preliminary Study of the Applicability of Chinese Textbooks from the Results of SmartReading® Test-Taking Grade 7 LI Learners at an International School in Taiwan.” Her research was motivated by the changing demographic in Taiwan’s international schools, which has shown an increase in the number of Taiwanese learners in the student body. Choosing suitable Chinese textbooks for those students is essential, but opinions differ on the selection of appropriate materials for this group of LI (Chinese as a First Language) learners.

Some instructors prefer to use self-edited textbooks, the quality of which is likely to be inconsistent. Others use textbooks approved by the Ministry of Education. However, the limited number of hours allotted to Chinese language study in English-medium schools has led many teachers to adopt the strategy of choosing a lower grade level of materials to meet learners’ needs. In response to the growing need to accommodate this student demographic, Hsu’s study explored the following questions: How many grade levels should materials be adjusted downward to meet the needs of LI Chinese learners at international schools? What is the reading level of those learners? How can teachers improve the effectiveness of Chinese learning for LI learners? Her study included 73 Grade 7 LI learners at DIS as participants, comparing the results of two tests taken by those students in 2019-20 and 2020-21: (1) the pre-test and post-test results of the “Diagnostic Assessment of Chinese Competence” (DACC) provided by SmartReading® Platform, developed by Taiwan Normal University and (2) the Nanyi Chinese Standardized Tests. Learners’ reading ability was assessed along five dimensions: word recognition, surface textual understanding, textual integration, inference comprehension, analysis and evalua-



tion. The data was then analyzed to explore possible correlations between Chinese textbook selection and learning outcomes. In addition, overall assessment of reading comprehension in Chinese as measured by DACC was compared with the reading scores of seventh-grade learners in Taiwan’s local education system in order to identify the reading difficulties of LI learners at DIS and propose ways to enhance their reading ability. The results of this research provided the Chinese Department with new ideas for redesigning our curriculum and with a clearer direction in choosing suitable Chinese textbooks for the upcoming school year, which will benefit all G1- G8 LI Chinese learners.

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A message about Grades from our 2022 Valedictorian

Growing up, kids are always told that in order to be successful in life, they have to have good grades. In some cultures, this idea is ingrained into the minds of children from a very young age. Contrary to popular belief, though, good grades do not accurately reflect a person's intellectual ability or determine their success.

It is commonly believed that those who get the highest grades in university are more likely to have successful careers in the future. During his research on this issue, though, Charles W. Cole came up with surprising results. His research showed that “students who received average or below-average grades frequently rose to the top in business and other professions” (Samuel, 2020). The problem with grades is that, depending on the student, they are not always a sign of effort. “If your child is getting straight A's without trying, it could be a sign that they are not being challenged. And without challenge, there is no effort.” (Bainbridge, 2020). When in a workplace environment and faced with a challenge, such a person may not know how to handle the situation properly. Why? Growing up, they were handed good results without putting in much effort. In contrast, “kids who study hard might get stressed and fail a test, but all we will see is the fat F on the report card” (Burger & Tabassum, 2019). Looking past the failing grade, a student who works hard in an effort to get a good grade learns more than one who gets a good grade without putting in much effort. Such a student is also more likely to perform better when faced with a challenge in a workplace setting. That is not to say that grades are not important, but unless the grades reflect “effort and hard work” in addition to “knowledge and learning”, the student may not achieve the success they expect from the straight A's (Bainbridge, 2020).

Now that it has been established that grades do not determine success, the question remains: What does determine success? According to Chuck Zulanis from The Leadership Society of Arizona, there are “3 keys to becoming successful in any area of life: Find what you love and are good at, don't wait, start doing it, put everything you have into it” (Zulanis, 2020). Practice makes perfect. Ideally, you would want your career to be something you are truly interested in. In order to excel in that field, you have to be good at your job. If you already know what you are interested in, do not wait for someone to teach you that in school. This generation has access to unlimited sources through the internet. It would not make sense not to use that to your advantage.

One question parents may ask is this: “How are my children supposed to get into good universities if they don't have good grades in school?” You want to send your kids to university to be successful in life, but a university degree does not guarantee success. In fact, “a recent study found that 38% of billionaires graduate from elite schools, but about 30% didn't go to college or it's not recorded where they attended. Another 23% of billionaires attended college (but not an elite school), and it doesn't say if they graduated. The fact that 30% didn't go to college and even more didn't go to an elite school means almost 1 out of 2 powerful people either didn't go to college or went to just a regular college.” (Zulanis, 2020) These are some of the most successful people of our time, and the fact that a considerable number of them did not go to college shows that a paper with an elite university name on it does not determine success. Plus, you would save yourself quite a lot of money by not attending overpriced schools.

Though straight A's might look good on paper, they do not necessarily reflect a person's intellectual ability or determine their success. In order to be successful in your career, you have to find what truly interests you and excel at it of your own accord, not because a teacher told you to do so.



Throughout the year, in spite of difficult circumstances in which athletes had to compete he kept competing.


