COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This Social Studies course is designed to ensure the students understand the cultural exchange and histories of the regions of the eastern hemisphere. After taking this course students will be able to read, understand, and identify through primary and secondary sources the histories of the Americas, as well as name important characters, places, and events that helped create the trade networks and cultural exchanges that make this region the economic powerhouse it is today. Students will also familiarize themselves with the academic vocabulary necessary to understand and discuss social studies.

Barring some exceptions for holidays, exams, and shortened weeks, classes will follow a standardized weekly structure. The first day of the week will begin with an in-class discussion of that week's reading. Students will need to read the material ahead of time in order to contribute to this discussion. The next class period will be the slideshow and teacher presentation of the same material. At the end of the presentation there is a slide containing 5-10 questions. If students discussed all the points of the presentation during their discussion they have demonstrated content knowledge. Students will not be required to write the answers to the questions and everyone in the class will receive 100% provided they remember to push the submit button on Google Classroom. If students didn't prepare adequately for and left out important information in their discussion they will be assigned the questions.

After the discussion and lecture are completed the remainder of the week will be spent on some

project including but not limited to: research essays, in-class presentations, Socratic seminars,

debates, and quizzes. The instructions will be provided on the third day with the instructions posted

to Google Classroom. The remainder of the week will be spent working on these projects. When

research is necessary students will be instructed to bring laptops on Google Classroom.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

At the end of this course students will be able to:

• Determine the central ideas or information of a primary or secondary source; provide an accurate summary of

the source distinct from prior knowledge or opinions.

• Identify key steps in a text's description of a process related to history/social studies

• Describe how a text presents information

• Distinguish among fact, opinion, and reasoned judgment in a text.

• Read and comprehend history/social studies texts in the grades 6-8 text complexity band independently and

proficiently.

• Cite specific textual evidence to support analysis of primary and secondary sources.

ASSESSMENT:

There will be a combination of formative and summative examinations for this course. These will

include but not be limited to; standardized tests, daily coursework, in-class discussion, written

reports, and presentations. Quizzes will generally be short-answer and students will only be required

to answer a certain percentage of questions. The exact numbers will be written on the quizzes

themselves. Expect 2-4 quizzes per quarter.

For quarterly exams quarters 1 and 3 will have a normal examination. Quarters 2 and 4 will replace

this examination with a written report on a topic of the students' choice to be determined later.

Details on how to choose a topic, sources, write citations, etc, will be given when it comes time to

write these examinations.
