COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This 12th grade Language Arts course is designed to cultivate advanced literacy skills, critical thinking, and effective communication. Students will engage with a diverse range of complex texts, including classic and contemporary literature, informational texts, and multimedia sources. The curriculum aligns with common core standards, focusing on:

- Reading comprehension and analysis of literature and informational texts
- Writing for various purposes and audiences
- Speaking and listening skills for effective communication
- Language usage, grammar, and vocabulary development
- Research and media literacy skills

Throughout the year, students will explore themes such as human achievement, tradition and reason, emotion and experimentation, and new ideas and voices. They will develop their ability to analyze, interpret, and evaluate texts while honing their writing skills across multiple genres.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Analyze and interpret complex literary and informational texts, including their themes, structures, and rhetorical features
- 2. Write clear, well-structured essays and narratives for various purposes, demonstrating sophisticated use of language and style
- 3. Conduct in-depth research using multiple sources, evaluate their credibility, and present findings effectively
- 4. Participate in collaborative discussions, responding thoughtfully to diverse perspectives and expressing ideas clearly and persuasively
- 5. Deliver formal presentations, integrating multiple sources of information and using digital media strategically
- 6. Apply advanced grammar and vocabulary skills in reading and writing, including understanding nuances in word meanings and analyzing the cumulative impact of specific word choices on meaning and tone
- 7. Evaluate and synthesize information from multiple sources, assessing the strengths and limitations of each source
- 8. Develop critical thinking skills through literary analysis and argumentation, including the ability to identify logical fallacies and evaluate competing arguments
